Hermantown Fire Department

History

The Hermantown Fire Department (HFD) officially became a municipal fire department under the City of Hermantown on January 1, 2024, at 12:00 a.m., transitioning from the Hermantown Volunteer Fire Department (HVFD) which was a 501C that has been contracting with the city since 1951. At the time of this transition, approximately 75% of HVFD's dedicated members continued their service with HFD, ensuring a strong foundation of experience and community commitment. Today, HFD operates as a combination department with 25 paid-on-call firefighters and two full-time staff members, providing enhanced coverage and emergency response capabilities.

The department's personnel bring a diverse range of experience, from brand-new firefighters and EMS providers to members with over 20 years of service. This blend of expertise allows HFD to maintain a strong focus on both fire suppression and life safety services. HFD actively engages in fire and life safety education, performing routine fire and life safety visits at local businesses and private residences to help ensure the community meets high safety standards.

A significant advancement in 2024 was the implementation of the First Due response software, which integrates the Community Connect platform. This system allows residents and businesses to voluntarily share critical information about their properties, such as emergency contacts, occupants, hazards, and structural details. This data provides responders with vital information during emergencies, improving situational awareness and ensuring a safer, more effective response.

HFD also continues to support the Live-In Program, where college students and military personnel reside at the station while gaining hands-on experience in fire and EMS operations. This program has become a valuable pathway for developing the next generation of fire service professionals by providing mentorship, training, and real-world experience.


Through these advancements and a commitment to safety, training, and community service, the Hermantown Fire Department remains dedicated to protecting the lives and property of those it serves.



CALLS FOR SERVICE


The Hermantown Fire Department experienced a significant uptick in activity in 2024, responding to 1,483 calls for service, a 14% increase over 2023, representing 212 more calls. In 2024 the fire department saw a slight increase in mutual calls, this was in part due to St. Louis County dispatch knowing our new model of always having two people on call 24/7 365 days a year.

The department saw a decrease in car accidents, however the ones they responded to were more severe with major life threating injuries. We did respond to one fatal motorcycle crash. We also responded to several structure fires, with one occurring within city limits and others as part of our automatic aid to neighboring departments. Tragically, one of these fires resulted in the loss of the homeowner's life. Additionally, the department had a busy spring dealing with a surge in grass fires, likely due to the lack of snow during the winter season, which created more favorable conditions for wildfires to spread.

Overall, 2024 was a year of increased demand for the department, marked by a mix of severe accidents, structure fires, and seasonal wildfires, all contributing to our higher call volume.








Response Time

Improving response times for firefighters is critical for saving lives and minimizing property damage during emergencies. One of our goals with going to the new department structure was reducing response time on priority calls. Having two members on shift 24/7 and having them respond from their home with a medical apparatus has shown a significate decrease in the response time. In 2023 the average response time to a call was over 8 minutes. Staff set a goal at the beginning of the year to have response time under 7 minutes. The average response time in 2024 was 5 minutes 42 seconds for priority calls.
